St. Peter's is in dynamic mode: our Council and deacons are thoughtfully, lovingly building community. The Spirit is present in our midst! An open-hearted and inclusive congregation like St. Peter's is greatly needed, and you are a vital part of the work! For your prayers, talents, and presence in the many and varied ways you offer them, we are grateful. As the late Frederick Buechner* said, "The grace of God means something like: Here is your life. You might never have been, but you are, because the party wouldn't have been complete without you. Here is the world. Beautiful and terrible things will happen. Don't be afraid. I am with you. Nothing can ever separate us. It's for you I created the universe. I love you."

Our journey of accompaniment continues. *Grace and peace, Donna*

*Columnist Michael Gerson wrote a tribute to theologian, author, and Pastor Frederick Buechner in *The Washington Post*, saying "Buechner was a writer tuned into the frequency of grace. [Buechner said] 'Pay attention to moments when unexpected tears come to your eyes and what may trigger



them.' He was talking about those sudden upwellings of emotion we get from the sublimity of nature or art, when we see a whale breaching, or are

emotionally ambushed by a line in a film or poem. We are led toward truth and beauty by a lump in the throat."

Report from Council

The Council held a joint meeting and potluck cookout with the deacons on August 3. The Council's decisions made at the meeting are listed below.

- Reverend Elia's Pastor's Report included a summary of pastoral visits, including to Cynthia Olds in Philadelphia and the graveside service for Harold Silvernale on August 1.
- Jere Wrightsman agreed to coordinate the Peace and Global Witness Offering.
- Mary Anne Davis agreed to be Clerk Pro Tem until another person steps up. After discussion about pro tem being *for the moment*, Council and Mary Anne agreed that she will serve as Clerk from now until December 31.
- Jere and committee that initially seated Donna as Pastor at St. Peter's for the summer recommended that Council extend her contract until May 31, 2023. Council approved.
- Donna said that items sometimes occur, or people come to her with issues or requests. She recommended referring such occurrences to committees, where possible, rather than to the full Council, saving Council from time-consuming votes and processes. Committees will then report as necessary. The Council approved proceeding this way.
- Co-treasurers Wendy Diskin and Jeff
 Kiplinger have researched and discussed the
 most economical way to purchase fuel oil
 based on options offered by Valley Oil. They
 recommended and Council approved that St.
 Peter's prepay for 1600 gallons of fuel oil at
 the quoted price of \$4.29/gal, totaling
 \$6000.
- Donna led a discussion about stewardship, coming from a theological point of view vs budget driven. "Time, talent, and treasure make stewardship a thing of celebration," she said. People might consider, How/why does the church matter to me. If I want my money to reflect where my values are, where do I give? Donna said, "Pledging,

attending, and supporting are acts of worship." Council agreed it would be a good idea to have people reflect upon "Why the church matters to me" in the context of worship.

Report from Mission & Social Justice Ministry

St. Peter's has been hosting many outreach activities that have been organized by the deacons and others (many thanks!). To revive outreach, congregational vitality, and commitment to social justice, Council became a Matthew 25 church in 2021. However, events slowed plans to develop our own Matthew 25 themes and goals. Hopefully, we can revive our involvement in Matthew 25 by developing some actions and goals, tailored to St. Peter's.

As a representative of St. Peter's, I continue to be engaged with two groups: the Albany Presbytery Anti-Racism Task Force (along with Mary Anne Davis) and the Chatham Area Interfaith Council (CAIC) Anti-Racism Forum.

CAIC is a way for local religious leaders* to connect, and it organizes the area's interfaith services and events, such as the annual interfaith Thanksgiving Service. (*Leaders is loosely applied: anyone who is active in their faith.) The CAIC Anti-Racism Forum is a subgroup of CAIC that focuses on racial issues. Right now, we are working with the Columbia County Sheriff's Office on both racial issues and the need for chaplaincy (they have a chaplain at the jail, but there is always a need for volunteers both at the jail and for other things such as emergencies and natural disasters). We are also looking ahead to plan community events.

St. Peter's continues to be engaged in mission work or collections of money for mission, but not at a level as in the past. Part of that is due to the small size of the congregation and thus the number of people available to take on organizing projects, who are usually already doing quite a bit of volunteer work, both within and outside the church. I would propose to reinvigorate mission at St. Peter's by starting small and perhaps partnering with one or two of our sister Presbyterian churches, Valatie and Hudson, who do have ongoing mission projects.



homesteading roots down once again.


