Dear Ones at St. Peter's,

At a recent St. Peter's Council meeting, our intrepid clerk, Mary Anne Davis asked, "How many



sabbaticals have you taken in 33 years of ministry?" I replied, "This is my first one." This plan was in place before I began serving as pastor of St. Peter's, which continues to be a joy for me!

Beginning June 1 and extending through August 31, I will be

studying, blogging, and traveling — sometimes nearby, like the site of two lynchings in New York State, which is a Juneteenth event co-sponsored by the Albany Presbytery Anti-Racist Task Force (ARTF). In July, I'll go to the Deep South: Montgomery and Selma, Alabama, and Jackson and Money, Mississippi. August will include a trip to DC. The travel will include both visits to sacred sites and conversations with people doing the work of racial justice.

I will be available to St. Peter's during some of this time, preaching twice in June and at least once in July and again in August. This will be a mutually beneficial opportunity to reflect theologically on racial justice and the work of anti-racism. I so appreciate the Council's willingness to recognize the importance of this transformational time.

I will continue to moderate Council, as I can do that from anywhere. I certainly want to know about pastoral concerns. Please feel free to reach out to me. Quite honestly, I don't need a sabbatical from St. Peter's, but I am glad for this opportunity, especially for such a meaningful time to study, reflect, and with God's help, to lean more deeply in the direction of justice. It's a journey at the heart of our faith. How wonderful to get to share it with you!

#### My Story at St. Peter's

Since my lifetime at St. Peter's has been many years, I will start back at my childhood growing up next door to the Church.

Activities and playtime consisted of simple, ordinary pleasures. Roller skating on the cement sidewalk in front of the Church was my only chance of being able to use my roller skates. Sidewalks, and we did have them, were of gravel except for a small portion in front of St. Peter's that was made of cement.

Sunday School happened each and every Sunday. On cold winter days an older man, Fred Bartlett, provided a warm area for us. A fire in the potbellied stove upstairs was there to greet us, as were teachers such as Florence MacNish and Catherine Seipel.

Blueberrying in Austerlitz was a fun time as well as providing berries for pies at a Church dinner. We had picnics at Prospect Lake in South Egremont, MA. Pete Steuerwald would back his truck to a cement platform at the side of the Spencertown Store. We children would then get in the back of the truck and were taken to the lake for swimming, boat riding, pony riding, and trying to dance to a jukebox. Our parents then came with picnic provisions, and we all sat at a very long table to enjoy what they brought.

The Tower Club booth at the Chatham Fair will never be forgotten. Hard work, yes, but the whole town seemed to look forward to it from year to year. The Braley family provided transportation of the food and necessities from St. Peter's to the Fair. Going down to the basement of the Church during Labor Day weekend, many people appeared. Dough Murdock — Mr. Murdock to me as he was Branch Manager of the bank where I was then employed in Chatham — and Hiney Barden sat there peeling

potatoes and everything else that needed peeling. The assembly line never faltered. The Steam Table and sandwich and hamburger section provided many wholesome meals.

The Tent (where the Tower Club was then set up) had a good-sized sink to handle everything that had to be washed and dried. I can still remember Catherine Crellin, wife of Jack Crellin from the Board of Trustees at St. Peter's, saying "I could just jump in this sink!" Days were hot;, thunder and lightning with rain pouring down made rivers for us to stand in. The next year, we were located in a building. My sister, Bea Demnler, Mike (Myrtle) Braley, and Edythe Barden spent so much time at the Booth, one of the *carnies* asked them where their next stop at a Fair would be.

Christmas Bazaar time brings back memories of a long table filled with handmade stuffed animals and dolls, children's pajamas, quilted baby blankets and knitted items. There were felted birds, handpainted wooden houses, chances on a handmade afghan, "Grandma's Attic," a bake table, and lunch. A sight to behold — all of it!

Time marches on — Harold and I were married on Pearl Harbor Day in 1957 at St. Peter's by the Minister at the time who was blind. There was hesitation in marrying us due to the short length of time we had known each other.

It is my hope, and the hope of many, that St. Peter's will flourish for years to come.

## Rhubarb Is the Harbinger of Spring

Several years ago when Grace Ann Silvernale organized the St. Peter's Bake Table for the Summer in Spencertown event, she requested *all* 

*things rhubarb*. The following was my contribution:

#### **Rhubarb Nut Bread**

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Grease and flour two 8 x 4 x 3 loaf pans.

**Ingredients**: • 3/4 c each brown sugar & white sugar • 2/3 c vegetable oil • 1 egg, beaten • 1 c sour cream or buttermilk • 1 tsp baking soda • 1 tsp salt • 1 tsp vanilla • 2 1/2 c flour • 1 1/2 c, 1/2 -inch pieces of rhubarb • 1/2 c pecans, toasted then chopped when cool • 1 T butter, softened • 1/3 c granulated sugar

**Directions:** • Combine the sugars, oil, and beaten egg. • In another bowl, mix buttermilk or sour cream, baking soda, salt, and vanilla.

- Add the milk mixture to the sugar mixture alternately with the flour, beating well after each addition. Fold in rhubarb and toasted nuts.
- Pour into prepared pans. Combine softened butter and sugar and sprinkle the mixture on top of the dough. • Bake for about 1 hour.

The recipe does make two loaves, but, sadly, I only gave Grace Ann one loaf as my dog Raffles ate one!! I gave Grace Ann the price of the other. I now call it *Raffles Bread*.
