Robyn brought a gorgeous loaf of bread, which was added to the Communion plate. Elder Jere Wrightsman broke it during the liturgy as we shared in presiding at the table. Since the loaf was a late addition, it wasn't scored, but that didn't stop Jere from breaking it! As people came forward for Communion by intinction, we served the opulent plate of cut up pancakes.

At one level, it may seem that we made do with what we had, i.e., *pancakes*! At another level, Communion elements are meant to be made of ordinary grain from the earth. On Easter, the common bread we had, in abundance, was pancakes! We took ordinary "bread" blessed and broke it and gave it to the gathered community-

When you can, support these local farms; they have wonderful food. Tell them thank you for donating to the St. Peter's Soul Café.




#### A Cooking Lesson at St. Peter's




#### Kirkridge Retreat, April 28-30 By Nancy Ordman

#### **Pentecost**

This year, Pentecost is Sunday, May 28. It is always the 50th day after Easter in memory of *the Jewish Pentecost*, which took place 50 days after Passover. The name comes from the Greek word *pentekoste*, which means *fiftieth*. Our Pentecost service will be shared with congregants from the Valatie First Presbyterian Church IN VALATIE at 10 AM.

We learn about the Christian Pentecost in *Acts 2* in the New Testament, which begins:

<sup>1</sup>When the day of Pentecost had come, they were all together in one place. <sup>2</sup>And suddenly from heaven there came a sound like the rush of a violent wind, and it filled the entire house where they were sitting. <sup>3</sup>Divided tongues, as of fire, appeared among them, and a tongue rested on each of them. <sup>4</sup>All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages, as the Spirit gave them ability.

[From The Encyclopedia Britannica online]:

Pentecost commemorates the descent of the Holy Spirit on the Apostles and other disciples following the Crucifixion, Resurrection, and Ascension of Jesus Christ, and it is often celebrated as the beginning of the Christian church.

When the festival was first celebrated in the Christian church is not known, but it was mentioned in a work from the Eastern church, the *Epistola Apostolorum,* in the 2nd century. In the 3rd century, it was mentioned by Origen, a theologian and head of the catechetical school in Alexandria, and by Tertullian, Christian priest and writer of Carthage.

Why wear red? Red is a visual reminder of the *tongues of fire* that empowered the Apostles and others to proclaim the good news of Christ's resurrection in many languages to the crowds of pilgrims from many lands. It also signifies the presence of the Holy Spirit in our community and our unity in Christ.

So, if you can, wear **RED** when you come to Valatie for church on May 28!

A time for gathering and refreshments will follow the service.
